On a chilly but sunny Wednesday morning, 16 April, a group of us set off to London for a guided walk exploring classic London Mews and 'hidden passageways'. We met our guides at Earl's Court tube station, after a much enjoyed coffee stop at Paul's café/patisserie.

From the hustle and bustle of the Earl's Court Road, in just a few seconds we proceeded to enter a series of beautiful and tranquil mews (the former stables and coach houses of grand houses) and hidden alleyways! It was a wonderfully interesting and informative walk with lots of photos, facts and history supplied by our guides Stephanie and Claire. For the next 2 hours we didn't encounter a single busy road or traffic noise. From decorative coal holes to the earliest Post Box, grand mansions to tiny mews apartments, manure to Thomas Crapper, the gentry to the servants. We saw it all! Many thanks to Irene Gawne for organising such a memorable day in London.











Guided Walk of Highgate Cemetery

A chilly but dry day was forecast; a trouble free journey to Archway and a walk to the cemetery which largely skirted Highgate Hill (thanks Irene) meant we arrived in time for a liquid pit stop before the tour.

The omens were looking good.

Our tour guide Peter (a former history teacher no less) gave us a potted history of the origins of this and the other six cemeteries (collectively known as the Magnificent Seven) built in the Victorian era beyond the boundary of the City Of London. Highgate Cemetery is the final resting place of c175,0000 bodies in c 53,000 graves.

Built in 1839 the grounds were an immaculate showpiece with extensive views across London. It is now beautifully shaded and wooded and a haven for wildlife. Widely used as a film set many films including Hammer Horror were filmed here.

Our 2 hours walk followed Colonnade Path where we paused by the graves of the poisoned Russian dissident Litvinenko and the singer George Michael. Walking up Main Drive we paused at the grave of the first burial - Elizabeth Jackson, a victim of consumption. We turned into Egyptian Avenue towards the Circle Of Lebanon where we saw an interesting mix of Egyptian and Victorian Gothic architecture. In the Terrace Catacombs we were introduced to the surgeon Robert Liston, the first surgeon in Britain to use an anaesthetic when operating.





The next grave was that of Thomas Sayers the bare knuckle fighter, so famous that his funeral attracted a crowd of over 100,000. The largest funeral ever seen at Highgate. Next up a reflective pause by a small, unmarked space between two graves; the final resting place of ten forgotten young "fallen women" lured to London to escape poverty but had died while staying at a local women's refuge. Finally down Faraday Path to pause at the very simple grave of Highgate's most important resident, Michael Faraday, who among his many discoveries were the principles behind the electric motor.

On a lighter note our tour concluded at the grave of the cookery writer and TV chef Philip Harben who is reputed to have popularised scampi following his shows in the 1950s.

Our tour over we were free to explore at leisure the East side.

Guided Walk of Fabulous Fitzrovia

On Monday 23 June a group of LCA members made our way to Euston Square Tube Station to meet our two guides and embark on a fascinating walking tour of 'Fabulous Fitzrovia & its Medical Marvels'.

Our first stop was to admire the cruciform shape and architecture of the

original University College Hospital (UCH) building. The walk was peppered with copious blue plaques and facts about the many eminent scientists and doctors who worked in the hospital or studied or taught at University College London, and we learned about their incredible medical discoveries. We also learned that George Orwell died aged only 46 in a bed in the Hospital where he was being treated for tuberculosis. During WWII Agatha Christie volunteered in the dispensary of the hospital and it is believed a pharmacist working there inspired Christie on the possible use of poisons. The walk meandered through University College London buildings and included a diverse architectural mix from Georgian to ultramodern. We ended the tour in an exquisite Byzantine-style chapel, The Fitzrovia Chapel, in

Pearson Square. The chapel was built for the former Middlesex Hospital to serve as a place of solace, prayer and rest for staff, patients and their families, It is absolutely stunning!

ROYAL COURTS OF JUSTICE AND THE OLD BAILEY Wednesday October 22nd at 11.30am

Legal London Tour: This is a multi award winning tour of over 25 years covering both the Royal Courts of Justice (RCJ) and the Old Bailey. It starts at the RCJ, a stunning historical building where some of the country's most significant legal judgements are made. Find out why barristers wear wigs. Learn of the huge sums earned by some lawyers and why barristers working in the criminal justice system went on strike. The good and the bad in our justice system are revealed.

This is followed by a wander through the secret alleys and courtyards of the nearby Inns of Court. The tour then moves on to the Old Bailey, the country's leading criminal court, for a talk outside on the fascinating history of the Old Bailey and the trials? Govered by the guide, which shocked the nation.

After the tour, we can try to gain entry to the public galleries and watch a trial but this is not guaranteed as it is a government building. However, it is unusual not to gain entry.





WALKS

We are continuing our regular monthly walks on the first and second Wednesday of each month through countryside, riverside, & parkland. The walks are designed to be gentle and jolly; at modest pace, with few stiles, and easy gradients.

The morning, 3-4 mile ("Short") walks, lasting about 2 hours, usually alternate with 4-7 mile ("Longer") walks. The latter normally incorporate a lunch or picnic break, but we often adjourn for a snack after the short walks too.

3rd Oct - Lowry Jessica Saraga

L S Lowry claimed he wasn't an artist, 'just someone who paints'. He painted the industrial landscape he knew again and again. But although his subjects were repetitive, his approach was unique. We can immediately identify his signature scenes of urban life. In this lecture, we look for the origins of his distinctive personal style. How did this full time rent collector so singularly encapsulate the essence of the last century's manufacturing north?

10th Oct - Weimar Ronnie Ireland

The "Weimar" period in Germany (1919 - 1933), was one of extremes - social, political, economic, played out before a ravishingly decadent nightlife. Out of this chaos rose very powerful, socially engaged art, which encompassed elements of Expressionism, Cubism and Dadaism, before developing "New Objectivity" and film as means of commenting on the turbulent metropolis of Berlin.







17th Oct - Genius of Women Artists. Tammy Ellis

Following on from the exhibition 'Now You See Us. Women Artists in Britain 1520–1920'- at Tate Britain (May-October 2024), we shall chart the course of women artists over the span of 4 centuries in their bid to become professional artists. Defying the expectations of society, the works of artists such as Artemisia Gentileschi, Angelica Kauffman and Laura Knight will reveal how these women celebrated their genius.





24th Oct - Gardens in Paintings David Marsh

This talk looks at a series of paintings from the 16th to 18th centuries which feature gardens, and helps the audience see beyond the obvious. Are the pictures useful evidence for the history gardens? Are they "accurate" depictions? What else might they be telling us?

7th Nov - Joaquín Sorolla: Spanish Master of Light Anne Anderson

In his day the Valencian painter Joaquín Sorolla y Bastida (1863-1923) was acclaimed for capturing the bright sunlight of his native land. Thanks to recent exhibitions, his stunning images of sun-drenched beaches have once again enraptured the public.

An advocate of pictorial realism, inevitably Sorolla's reputation was eclipsed by Cubism and Abstraction. But now Sorolla has been recuperated and ranked alongside John Singer Sargent: both artists brought the practise of painting quickly outdoors to a triumphant conclusion.



14th Nov - The Game of Pairs: Fantastic Reality Ronnie Ireland

The GAME OF PAIRS series of lectures take two images from different times and places, comparing and contrasting them to discover connections and differences of attitude and intent between the two. This first one looks at "The Birth Of Venus" by Botticelli and "Woman Bathing In A Stream" by Rembrandt. It places them in the context of their time and society, showing how their very different aims and techniques were both able to deliver masterpieces for their own time and for ours.

21st Nov - The London Impressionists - Camden Town & Fitzrovia Anne Anderson

German-born Walter Sickert was the central figure in the Camden Town Group, named after the seedy district of north London. Though he was the son and grandson of painters, he first sought a career as an actor. After less than a year's attendance at the Slade School, Sickert left to become a pupil of and assistant to the infamous American-British painter James Abbott McNeill Whistler.

Influenced by Edgar Degas, he developed a personal version of Impressionism, favouring sombre colours and working in the studio to escape the 'tyranny of nature'. Joining the New English Art Club, he came into contact with other progressive British painters: William Orpen, Philip Wilson Steer, George Clausen and Stanhope Forbes. His portrayal of scenes in London music halls were criticised as scandalous. Seeking cheap places to rent Sickert found studios in Cumberland Market and Camden. Artists gathered around Sickert, the Camden Town Group officially coalescing in 1911: Harold Gilman, Spencer Frederick Gore, Lucien Pissarro, Robert Bevan, Augustus John, and Charles Ginner. Never more than 16 men, no women were admitted into this bohemian circle!



28th Nov - Cathy Brett - Turner. Young Mr. Turner in Surrey

Cathy Brett, artist, author and curator, offers a perspective on the early years of JMW Turner and why his visits to the Surrey Hills were so important to his development as an artist and a young man.


