It is our amazing Volunteers to whom I must pay tribute. You will see the Newsletter is full of events and activities. Coach trips have resumed, visits and concerts enjoyed. They have provided coffee mornings, art history lectures, organised walks, indoor games, music appreciation, a book club, friday talks, and children's films. How do we provide support for our guest speakers with regard to AV, it is of course one of our dedicated volunteers.

Full details of all our events are circulated regularly via MailChimp and advertised on both the noticeboards inside and outside the building.

I am sure by now most of you will have met our office team, Amy and Ruth. Their warm welcome, helpful and friendly manner are a great asset to the LCA and regularly praised by our hirers.

This outstanding Victorian Building celebrated 130 years since the laying of its foundation stone by Letitia and Winifred Dixon, the daughters of Abraham Dixon. On 10 February 2022 a special coffee morning was arranged, for members, to mark the occasion.

The Institute Trustees continue to update the building with the steady replacement of the large windows of this Victorian building and the repair of the surrounding stonework. We review the rooms leased to the Association on a regular basis and a programme of refurbishment is ongoing.

The Association continues its inclusion in the Mole Valley Heritage Open Days programme and your President and Treasurer sit on the Mole Valley organising committee. The 2022 theme will be 'Astounding Inventions' and the Institute will host events on Friday 9, Friday 16 and Saturday 17 September (see pages 14-16 for details of events).

As members will have noted, the Newsletter is circulated via Mailchimp to all those with an email address. The Trustees took this difficult decision due to the sizeable increase in the cost of second-class stamps in recent years.

AGM TALK POSTSCRIPT

David Hanson

After the AGM, Ian Bevan gave a very entertaining talk on the history of the Theatre Royal Drury Lane and the families that owned, developed and extended the building since 1660's. In reply to a question asked, Ian Bevan has written that, "At one point in the 1950s Prince Littler was Managing Director or Chairman of three theatre management companies, including the Stoll Theatres and the Moss Empires, and controlled most of the main theatres in the West End."

THE KIRBY LECTURES

In 1976 Frank and Joan Kirby, together with other members of the local community, were instrumental in driving forward the restoration of the community facilities at the Institute. In particular, the renovation of the hall which had been out of use for many years, was finally completed at a cost of £30,000 in 1987. The first meeting of the Leatherhead Community Association took place at the Institute on 14 December 1977.

Frank and Joan worked tirelessly, with their trustees, on behalf of the members over many years. On Joan's death in 2006, the Kirby Bequest was left to the LCA with the first Kirby Lecture taking place in 2009.

This series of lectures is now closing after eleven years. Members have been privileged to hear an interesting and diverse range of speakers. At the first event we welcomed Benedict Allen who also returned in 2010. There followed in 2011 Nick Danziger; 2012 John McCarthy; 2013 Stephen Sackur; 2014 Michael Buerk; 2015 Martin Bell; 2016 Nicholas Owen; 2017 Lord Daniel Finkelstein; 2018 Alex Brummer; 2019 Kate Humble.




Come and join us for a relaxing afternoon in the warmth of the Abraham Dixon Hall with a cup of tea and a good film.

Stunners: Artists and their Muses

The recent exhibition at the Royal Academy, *Whistlers Women in White: Joanna Hiffernan*, highlighted the symbiotic relationship between artist and model. Hiffernan was much more than a model; she was Whistler's muse, lover and collaborator, inspiring a series of paintings in the 1860s. Looking for a narrative *Symphony in White, No 1, The White Girl* was instantly misread by the public as representing the victim in Wilkie Collin's novel 'The Woman in White'. Dubbed 'Stunners' by Pre-Raphaelite painter Dante Gabriel Rossetti, the artist's muse was transformed into a celebrity. Alongside Hiffernan, this lecture considers Effie Millais, Jane Morris, Fanny Cornforth and Dorothy Dene.

14 October – Ronnie Ireland

Take 6: Interior

Take 6: INTERIOR came about during lockdown when we were very aware of our interior spaces. By taking six paintings of rooms by six different artists we will look at how they have presented these personal spaces.

The artists are; Vuillard, Van Eyck, Vermeer, Bacon, Hopper and Van Gogh. The comparison of the very different circumstances and intentions behind the works makes for a fascinating insight into how a seemingly simple theme can be the vehicle for complex personal stories.

21 October – Tammy Ellis

Joaquin Sorolla y Bastida

The Spanish artist Joaquin Sorolla y Bastida (1863-1923) is best known for his exquisite rendering of light effects. We shall consider Sorolla's entire career including his works on social themes, portraits, landscapes, seascapes and beach scenes (see the front cover for an example).

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Sorolla was among the most famous of living artists in Europe. Influenced by John Singer Sargent, Goya and Velazquez, his oeuvre is often compared to impressionist works yet he exhibits a unique quality in his painting technique which defies categorisation.

28 October – Tammy Ellis

Whose Art is it Anyway?

An artist may design an art work but if they do not participate in its creation or if they use assistants does this mean that the artist shouldn't fully lay claim to it? This lecture will aim to debate the question of what the term 'artist' actually means, particularly in relation to modern art and artists such as Andy Warhol and Damien Hirst. We shall also reference artists such as Michelangelo, Rembrandt and Rubens who worked in times when the criteria of authenticity and creation were much more relaxed

4 November – Daphne Jefferis

Paul Cezanne

This richly illustrated talk on the life and works of Paul Cezanne coincides with a major exhibition at Tate Modern this autumn of this great Post-Impressionist painter whose work was to influence so many artists who followed him. Beginning with his early years in Provence to his time in Paris and back to Provence, we see the struggle to find his own expressive language which was to finally produce some of the most uniquely powerful and beautiful works.


